CHRISTMAS AT NEWPORT CE

Over the past few weeks our whole school and class worships have been following the theme of Advent and sharing the story of the first Christmas. Our RE lessons have looked in depth at different aspects of this important Christian festival—covering themes such as 'Prophecy', The Trinity' and 'Incarnation'. We had KS1 and EYFS performing their version of the Nativity and KS2 have been practicing the carols for our Christmas Service which will be led by LKS2. Our Charity House Captains have arranged the reverse advent which will then be donated to the Foodbank and our Spirit Captains have been looking at reflection corners in all the classrooms to ensure consistency and interaction; and of course Christmas decorations have brightened up our hall.





NEWPORT CE SCHOOL CHOIR

Last month, 30 KS2 children experienced singing as part of a choir, on a stage in front of a huge audience and 5 other school choirs. They did an absolutely amazing performance of John Lennon's 'Imagine' and Queen's 'One Voice', as well as performing a larger choir with all the other schools. They represented themselves and the school so well. We were all extremely proud of them and the feedback that was given about their performance. This was just the start of a very





busy calendar for the choir with performances at Newport Minster as part of the Christmas lights switch on; the school fayre; Osborne House; Somers Brooke Court and the KS2 Christmas Service. Every time the choir are now performing, they will be wearing their new t-shirts which were kindly funded by the FoN — the children are wearing them with such pride.


ANTI—BULLYING WEEK / ODD SOCKS DAY

This year we again marked Anti-bullying Week by wearing odd socks. There were some wonderfully creative and wacky socks on show throughout the day. The theme for this year's Anti-bullying Week was "change starts with us". It was great to see the children all making a personal change to challenge negative behaviour no matter how small it seems at the time. The theme also tied in brilliantly with the Children In Need theme – "help a friend in need".



Tips for learning your multiplication tables

What does multiplication mean? Make sure that your child understands what the numbers in the multiplication really represent. Use concrete objects to show 'so many' groups of 'this much'. In this example 5 groups of 4 apples = 20 apples.



- Learn to double numbers! This really helps with making connections between the 2, 4 and 8 times table, the 3, 6 and 12 times table and the 5 and 10 times table.
- **Use it as a time filler.** When you are stuck in traffic, walking to school or waiting at the supermarket, recite the times tables. Little and often is much more manageable than spending hours practising.
- Use the right vocabulary. Take a simple multiplication sum, $3 \times 5 = 15$. The 3 and the 5 are what we call factors of 15 and 15 is a multiple of 3 and 5.
- **Use a number grid**. You can print off a simple 10 x 10 grid and use it to spot sequences and patterns within different multiplication tables.
- Learn the division facts alongside the multiplication facts. If I know that $3 \times 4 = 12$, then I also know that $12 \div 3 = 4$ and $12 \div 4 = 3$.
- **Make it real.** Try to find opportunities for your child to use multiplication in problem solving, such as calculating the price of more than one item of shopping or scaling up a recipe.
- **Create a challenge!** Make it a competition by keeping a record or their scores or timing them. Websites such as Timestables.co.uk allow you to print off tests at home or Mathsframe.co.uk will set timed challenges.



Use Sumdog. When you are logged into your city, look at the menu on the left hand-side. If you click on the green rectangle that says 'Training' you can change this to 'Tables'. Sumdog will then let you practise your times tables while playing your favourite games!

SPORTING NEWS

The Christmas term is always a busy one across the school, and this was certainly the case for

Sport and P.E at Newport CE. No fewer than 18 competitive sporting events have been organised across the term, in spite of some challenging weather conditions. Children have represented our school competitively in the sports of tag rugby, football, cross country, indoor cricket, table tennis, boccia, kurling and indoor athletics all in just the past 7 weeks.



Our Y5/6 tag rugby team qualified in impressive fashion for the island finals, losing out in the semi-final to a last second extra-time try. The recent Harwoods X-Country Championships saw 48 of our pupils compete with distinction, securing our school 10th place from 31 schools. Newport CE maintained its strong form from the summer cricket season, where we made the U9s finals, and won the U11 Island trophy, by qualifying for the indoor cricket island finals in the New Year after winning our cluster competition. Table tennis, boccia and kurling were all brought into the children's consciousness with teams representing Newport CE in competition and learning plenty about the sports along the way. As I write this on the last Friday before the last Friday, we will be busy up until the end with football fixtures and indoor athletics competitions both taking place before we break up.

In school our P.E focus has been on leadership, with each year group from Y2 up to Y6 having the chance to design, construct, lead and teach their lessons to their peers in the class. While it was a gamble to extend them such a significant opportunity to teach and lead, the results have been very positive, with children having the chance to come to the fore and really shine outside of their comfort zones. I believe this exposure to leadership situations is vital for their development as young people and have been most impressed by many. I have been told by more than a few that they would love to become P.E teachers one day, and having seen them,

I wouldn't doubt them!

Lastly, this week saw us say goodbye to Alberto Ibernon -Aviles, a spanish student who has been with us since September as part of his sports degree. He has brought culture and a smile to Newport CE, and has progressed hugely over his time with us. The kids and staff will be sad to see him go, but wish him luck for the future.


HISTORY AT NEWPORT

Newport CE Primary operates a two-year rolling programme and the teaching of History follows an enquiry-based model and is taught in blocks (1 to 4 weeks). Unit plans are designed to follow an overarching line of enquiry about a particular event, person or period in history and each lesson, or sequence of lessons, is based on the exploration of a 'key question'.

The following key areas of study will be covered in each phase of the school (KS1, LKS2, UKS2): chronology, characteristic features, continuity & change, cause & consequence, historical significance, historical interpretation and historical enquiry.

As children move through the school, new learning builds upon what has been studied previously and knowledge and skills are developed over time (cumulative learning).

UKS2 studied the Maya civilisation in History this Autumn. The children learnt what life was like for this ancient



civilization and how the Maya became such a rich and powerful society. The topic launched with a Mayan ceremony of chocolate eating (who knew that we have the Mayans to thank for the chocolate we love to eat today?) with a 'sacrifice' or two thrown in for good measure!

The children completely immersed themselves in this topic:

"The Mayan topic was exciting, fun and funny. I really enjoyed it. It really made the lessons fun and I enjoyed acting out the ceremony in our assembly." Freya
