We make this prayer through Christ our Lord. Amen

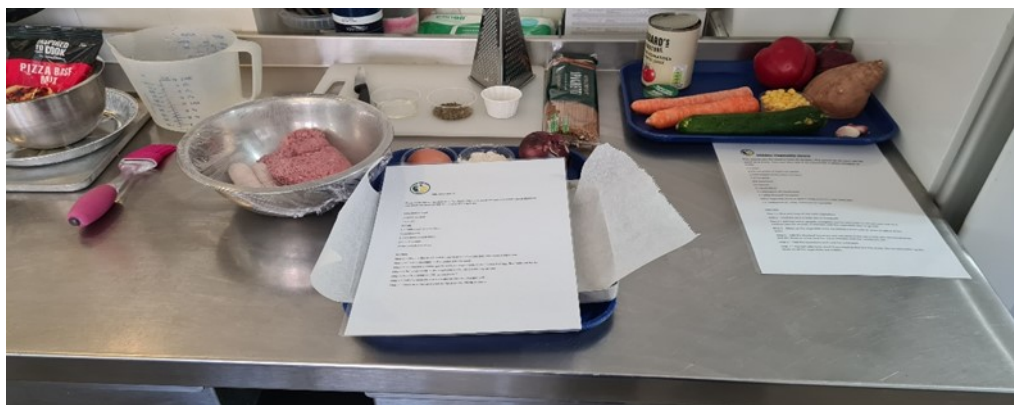
NEWS FROM THE CHOIR

MEMORIES FROM HADID CLASS

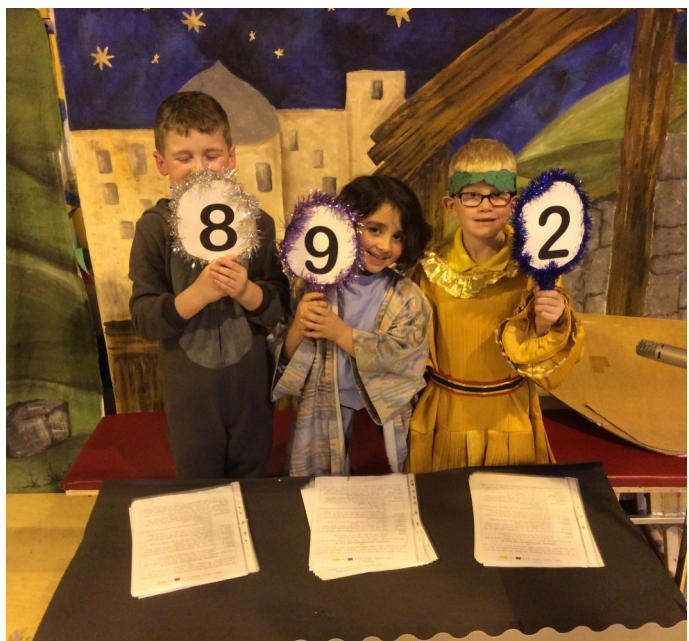
Hadid Class' favourite memories from the year.

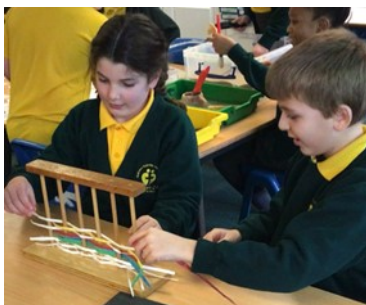
